How Can You Best Prepare for Harvard?

We hope you will read our thoughts about choosing high school courses that will provide a strong base for a liberal arts education. But in summary, we recommend:

- The study of English for four years: close and extensive reading of the classics of the world's literature
- Four years of a single foreign language
- **The study of history for at least two, and preferably three years: American history, European history, and one additional advanced history course**
- The study of mathematics for four years, including the particular topics described
- The study of science for four years: physics, chemistry, and biology, and preferably one of these at an advanced level
- Frequent practice in the writing of expository prose

Why Study History?



KEEPING YOUR OPTIONS OPEN

Choosing subject combinations that genuinely keep your options open is trickier than you might think. We often meet students who have chosen to study a mixture of essay subjects and maths / science subjects because they believe that it will keep their options open. While such a subject combination does provide a suitable preparation for many arts and social sciences courses at the University, it can make you a less competitive applicant for Cambridge's broad-based sciences courses.

There are, however, certain A-level subjects that are considered either essential or desirable for a number of courses at Cambridge. Choosing one or more of these will help you to keep your higher education options open. These subjects include:

- a modern language
- Biology
- Chemistry
- English Literature
- **History**
- Mathematics (and Further Mathematics)
- Physics

Even with the broad curriculum of the IB Diploma Programme, choosing subject combinations that genuinely keep your options open is trickier than you might think. As with A-levels, however, there are certain Higher Level subjects that are considered either essential or desirable for a number of courses at Cambridge. Choosing **one or more** of these to study at Higher Level will help to keep your higher education options open. These subjects include:

- Group 1: Language A Literature
- Group 2: a Language B option, Classical Languages
- **Group 3: History**
- Group 4: Chemistry, Physics
- Group 5: Mathematics
- Group 6: Consider taking a second option from groups 1-5.

Other Higher Level subjects that also facilitate course choice at Cambridge include Further Mathematics (normally taken in Group 6, in addition to Mathematics in group 5) and Biology (group 4 or 6).

NB. for students in the UK, the Further Mathematics Support Programme offers the opportunity to study Further Mathematics even if it is not offered by your school.

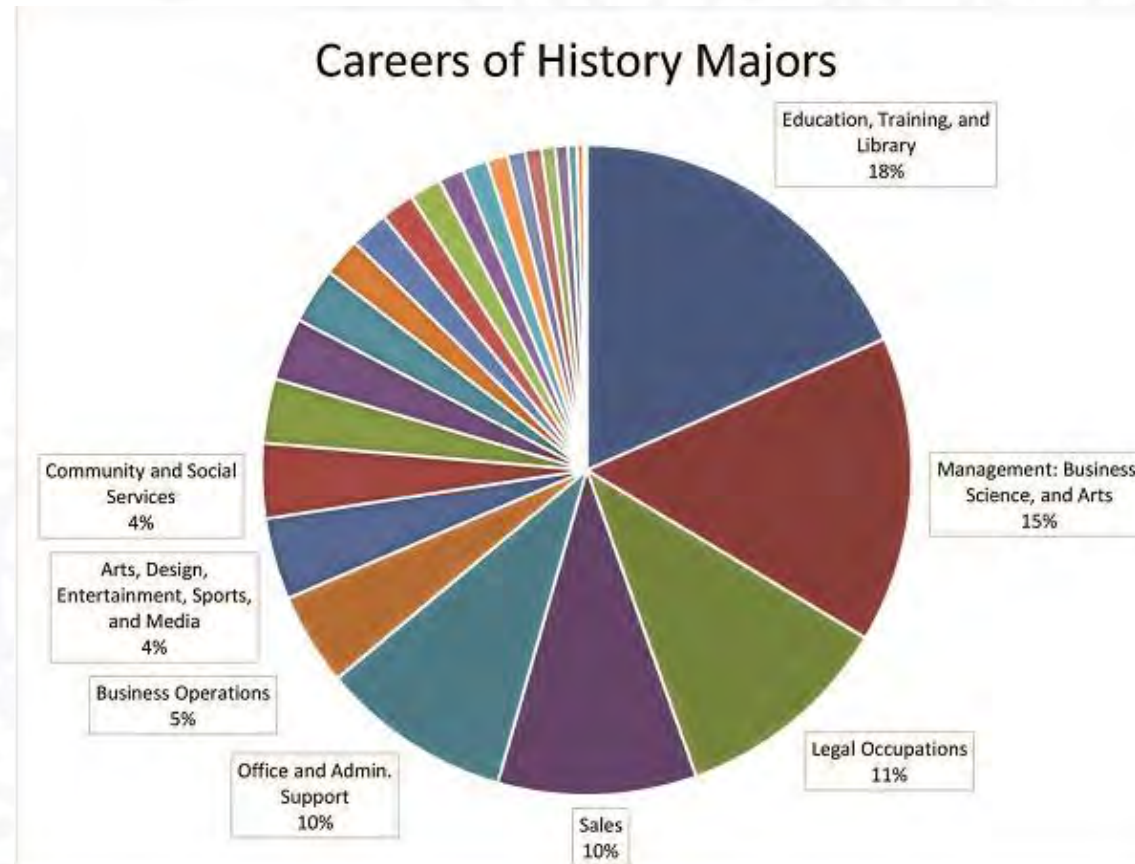

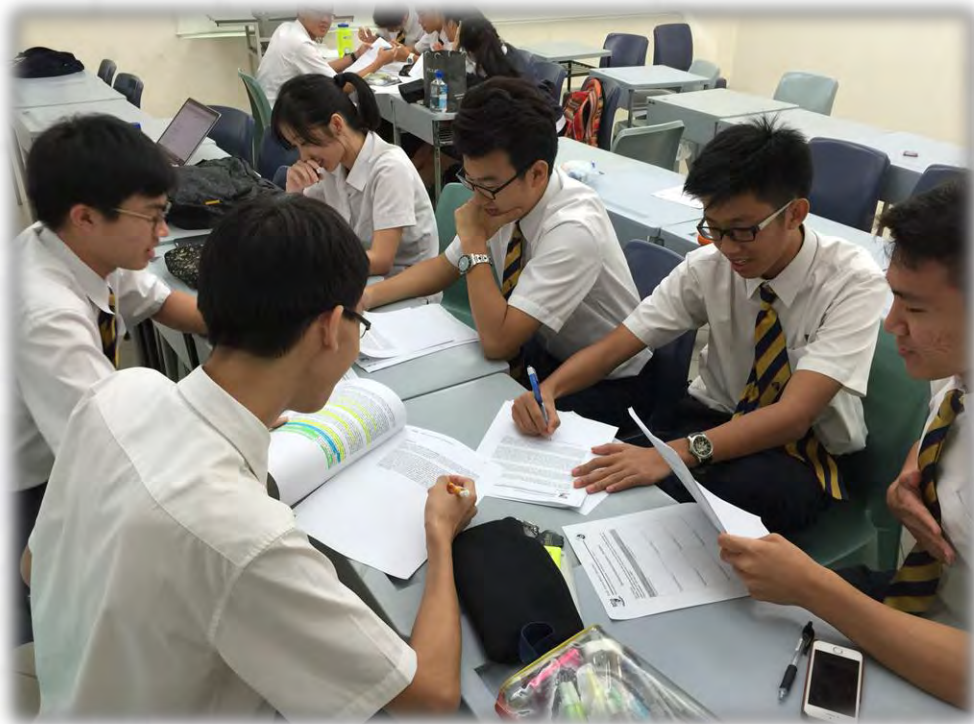

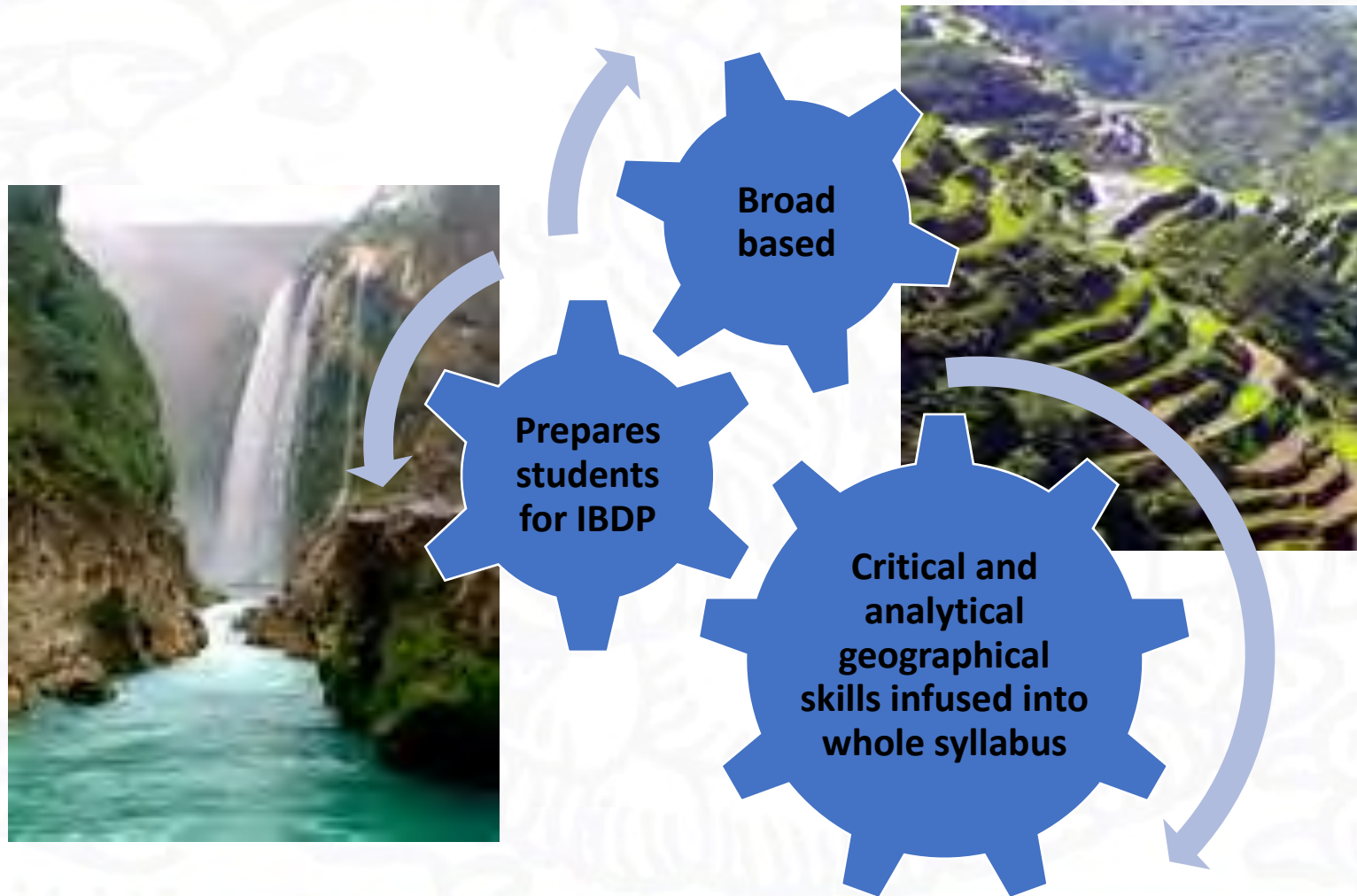

Year 3 & 4 Geography - Skills



- Geographic skills provide the necessary **tools and techniques for us to think** geographically.
- The skills are central to the subject's distinctive approach to understanding Earth's physical and human patterns and processes: **observe patterns, associations and spatial order**
- Ability to **acquire, arrange and use geographic information** helps us **make decisions** important to everyday life, e.g. where to buy/rent home, where to get a job, where to shop, where to vacation.



Year 3 & 4 Geography - Skills



- **Community decisions** relating to problems of air, water and land pollution, location issues, e.g. where to place industries, schools, residential areas
- **Business decisions**, e.g. best site for supermarket, airports, issues of resource use or international trade
- **Political decisions**, e.g. evaluation of foreign affairs, international economic policy, local zoning and land use
- Geographic skills aid in the development and presentation of effective, persuasive arguments regarding matters of public policy

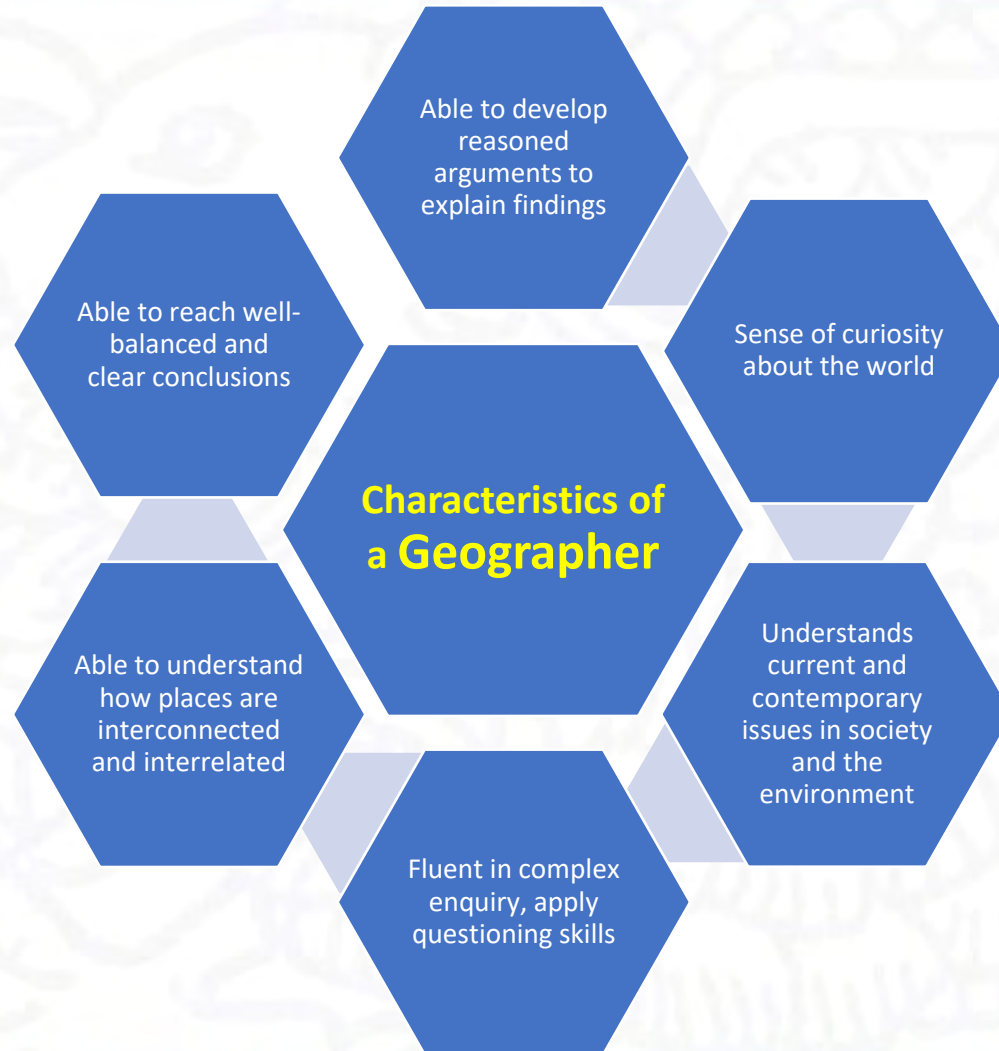

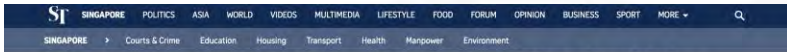

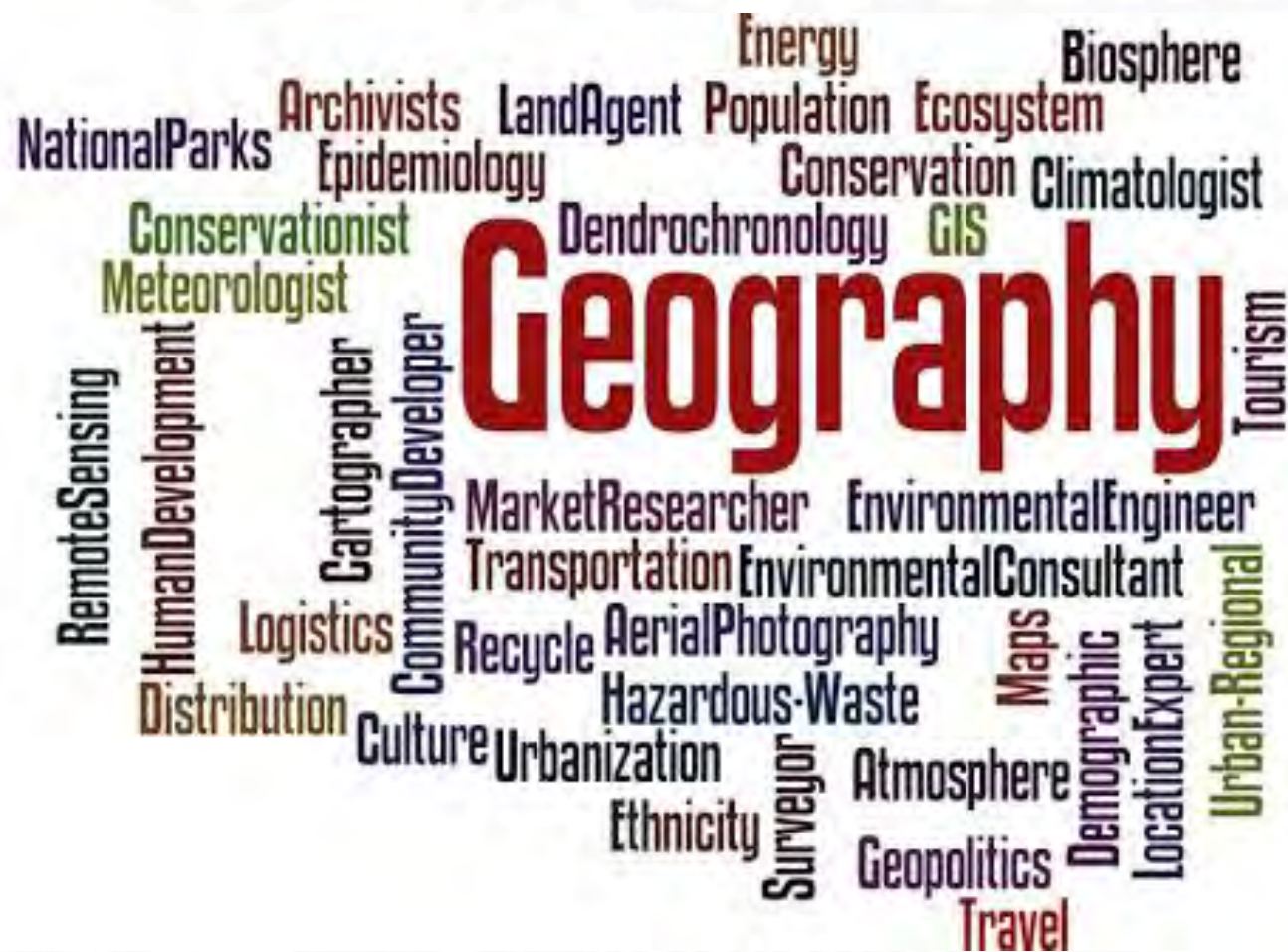
