Language B

Nature and Aims

The Language B course is designed for students with some previous experience of the target language. In the language B course, students further develop their ability to communicate in the target language through the study of language, themes and texts. In doing so, they also develop conceptual understandings of how language works.

The Language B course provides students with the intercultural understanding and allows them to go beyond the confines of the classroom, expanding their awareness of the world and fostering respect for cultural diversity.

Syllabus

Written Production (25%)

One writing task of 250–400 words from a choice of three, each from a different theme, choosing a text type from among those listed in the examination instructions

Listening comprehension (25%)

Comprehension exercises on three audio passages, including personal, professional and mass media texts, drawn from all five themes.

Reading comprehension (25%)

Comprehension exercises on three written texts, including personal, professional and mass media texts, drawn from all five themes.

Internal Assessment (25%)

Individual Oral Exam (25%)

A conversation with the teacher, based on a visual stimulus, followed by discussion based on an additional theme.
